The selection of indicators for this publication was guided by national relevancy and compliance with the global list of SDGs indicators, as well as usage for 2020 VNR, availability of the time-series data and disaggregation dimensions required. Additionally, the performance (trend) by SDGs indicators is presented. All relative indicators are calculated applying the usual residence population, except a few indicators marked with asterisk, for which the stable population was used.






#### Absolute poverty rate, by sex, %






### Labour productivity in agriculture, thousand USD






### Proportion of small agricultural producers production volume in total agricultural production, %





### The agriculture orientation index for government expenditures, %




#### Volume of official development assistance for agricultural sector, million USD








### Mortality rate for children aged 0-4 years, per 1000 live-births, by area \*



### Mortality rate for children aged 0-4 years, per 1000 live-births, by sex \*











Adolescent birth rate (aged 15-19 years), per 1000 women of respective age






Proportion of population with household expenditures on health larger than 10% of total household expenditure, %


Participation rate of youth and adults in formal and nonformal lifelong education, %







Parity index (female/male) per education level calculated on the basis of corresponding gross enrollment rates, 2018, %






#### Proportion of teachers with pedagogical education, 2018, %






## Proportion of schools with access to Internet for pedagogical purposes, %





### Proportion of schools with access to computers for pedagogical purposes, %






Prevalence of violence against women and girls (15-65 years old) from an intimate partner/husband, over the last 12 months, 2010, % \*






### Coverage of children under 3 years old with childcare services, %




### Proportion of seats held by women in the national parliament, %

## Proportion of population having a sanitation service and bath or shower within the dwelling, %








### Proportion of population connected to the public sewerage system, %








## Proportion of wastewater sufficiently treated in the total water discharge, non-residential sector, %


Proportion of water abstractions from the total water sources available (Water Stress Index)



### Proportion of households, by primary energy sources used for domestic needs, 2015, % \*










#### Renewable energy share in the total final energy consumption, %





### Consumption of primary energy (gross consumption), 2018,%



### Proportion of informal employment in non-agriculture sector, by sex, %









Manufacturing gross value added as a proportion of GDP, %








Proportion of small enterprises (up to 49 employees) that accessed credits/loans, 2018, %











CO2 emissions generated by the industrial sector per gross value added in industry, kg CO2/USD (constant prices of 2010)










Growth rate of household expenditures per capita among the total population \*






Growth rate of household expenditures per capita among the bottom 40 per cent of population, % \*






#### **Proportion of the labour force costs in the Gross Domestic Product, %**

Proportion of population with monthly expenditures for dwelling maintenance that exceed 30% of the household monthly disposable income, by area, %








Proportion of persons living in dwellings with more than 2 persons per room, by area, %








Rate of population connected to municipal waste collection services, %








Amount of hazardous waste generated per capita, kg/person






**Amount of waste (from production and consumption)** generated, thousand tonnes





**Proportion of waste (from production and consumption)** recycled out of total waste generated, %







Number of deaths attributed to disasters per 100,000 population, by age groups








Number of directly affected persons attributed to disasters per 100,000 population, by type










#### Chemical indices of surface water eutrophication, %

#### Nitrate concentration - mgN / I




#### Phosphate concentration - mgN / I





### Number of recorded incidents of illegal fishing






Forest fund area as a proportion of total land area, %






Proportion of important sites for terrestrial and freshwater biodiversity that are covered by protected areas, %






### Area of restored forest, ha









### Number of victims of human trafficking per 100,000 population




#### Number of victims of violence per 100,000 population





### Proportion of court cases lost at ECHR out of the number of applications communicated every year, %






Proportion of persons and businesses who made unofficial payments (paid a bribe) during the previous 12 months, % \*






### Proportion of women in the Government, %






### Total government revenue as a proportion of GDP, %






### Proportion of domestic budget funded by taxes and fees, %




